Each academic program is responsible for recommendations to the Graduate School on admission and Clifford D. Clark Diversity Fellowship for Graduate Students funding. Applicants must be admitted to the program before they can be nominated for the fellowship. Using the nomination form, each program is responsible for nominating applicants whom they recommend for the fellowship. Nominations should be submitted to the Graduate School by one of the review dates: February 1 (limited portion of awards), or March 1 (remainder of awards). Given the competitive nature of these awards, early submissions of strong applicants are encouraged.

Candidates for a Clifford D. Clark Diversity Fellowship for Graduate Students must:

- Be US citizens or have permanent resident status
- Be newly admitted to a graduate program
- Demonstrate how they will contribute to the diversity of the student body in their program

Preference will be given to candidates who are:

- From a low-income background (e.g., Pell-eligible as undergraduates), first-generation college students (students whose parents have not earned a bachelor's degree), have overcome adversity, are AmeriCorps alumni, or are veterans.

Applicants for this fellowship must provide an essay (maximum of 600 words) addressing how they will contribute to the diversity of the student body in their graduate program. The essay must address the following prompt:

“Please describe how you’ve engaged, facilitated, and/or enhanced diversity, equity, and inclusion efforts in your campus and/or local community. Examples could include personal, academic, and/or work experience and may include, but is not limited to, your potential to contribute to enhancing diversity efforts in your academic program at SUNY and campus communities; experiences overcoming economic, social, educational disadvantages, and/or other barriers”.

These scholarship programs are open to any and all prospective candidates regardless of race, color, national origin, or sex, and are consistent with all current governing federal and state nondiscrimination laws. All application submissions will be assessed and evaluated in accordance with the required eligibility criteria.

Required partial department support and total years qualified students can be funded:

- For a student entering a doctoral program with a bachelor's degree, support is for up to five years. Partial department support is required for one semester after the first year.
- For a student entering a doctoral program with a master's degree, support is for up to three years. Partial department support is required for one semester after the first year.
- For a student entering a master's program with a bachelor's degree, support is for up to two years. Partial department support is required for one semester after the first year.
