

Consumer Disclosure Information: Educational Requirements for Licensure in Psychology

The Clinical Psychology Program at Binghamton University has been accredited by the American Psychological Association (APA) since 1986, after five years of provisional accreditation. The Program is also a member of the Academy of Clinical Psychological Science. Over the years, 100% of our students who have sought licensure have achieved licensure. However, as licensure requirements vary across states, it is important to be aware of and comply with requirements in the state in which you seek licensure. Accordingly, in the Table below, we list contact information for every state licensing board and indicate, to the best of our current knowledge, whether the curriculum offered by our program meets or does not meet the educational requirements.

As requirements can and do change, please see the Association of State Boards of Professional Psychology (ASBPP) online tool, PsyBook (<https://www.asppb.net/page/psybook>) for updated information regarding requirements. We strongly recommend that you review the most current licensing requirements, directly check the web sites of the state licensing board where you seek to apply, and consult with and pose any questions to the state board in advance of filing your application.

Many state licensing boards consider students who earn their doctoral degrees from APA accredited programs eligible for licensure. We have marked an asterisk (*) to designate such programs. However, many jurisdictions require post-doctoral professional experience, in addition to educational and training requirements, and may also require background checks, credential verifications, and specific training requirements. To the best of our ability to determine, the findings we present are accurate as of July 2020.
